

The Lord's Supper is for you to remember Christ.



• REFLECTION:

1 Corinthians 11:23-25



• Transubstantiation: the bread and wine ACTUALLY BECOME the body and blood of Christ.



"In the most blessed sacrament of the Eucharist "the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, the whole Christ is truly, really, and substantially contained." [Catechism of the Catholic Church]



- Transubstantiation: the bread and wine ACTUALLY BECOME the body and blood of Christ.
- Consubstantiation: The bread and cup CONTAIN Christ's body and blood.



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- Spiritual Presence: Christ is spiritually present in a special way as we partake of the elements.
- Memorial: The elements are a symbol to help us remember what Christ did for us.

- Lord's Supper = (1 Cor. 11:20) As opposed to the table of YOURSELF (21) or the table of demons (10:21)
- Eucharist = "Giving of Thanks" (Matthew 26:27, 1 Cor 11:24)
- Communion (KJV) = "Koinonia" believers are sharing in something common—Christ's sacrifice and presence. (1 Cor. 10:16)

Living the Christian life takes faith.



YOUR CHALLENGE:

When you take Communion / the Lord's Supper / the Eucharist today and in the future, do so with REFLECTION, PROCLAMATION, and SELF-EXAMINATION because of what Christ has done for you.

Make things right between you and others in the Body of Christ this week.
